## Celebrate Life 5k Walk to benefit Bereavement Programs

The second annual Celebrate Life 5K Walk will be held on September 30th at the New Jersey State Fairgrounds. The walk will start at 10:00 a.m. Pre-registration starts at 9:00 a.m. and opening ceremonies at 9:30. The walk is a way to help those dealing with a loss celebrate the life and memory of loved ones who have passed.

Last year's event raised close to \$10,000 for the Bereavement Center Capital Campaign. This year the event will again support the Bereavement Center by providing much needed funds for the programs that are offered there.



Dealing with the loss of a loved one is an emotional process that each person handles differently. The Joseph T. Quinlan Bereavement Center offers support to members of the community who are going through the grieving process.

There are currently three Bereavement Center locations with the main office located on 5 Plains Road in Augusta, and two satellite offices located on Washington Street in Hackettstown and at The United Methodist Church in Milford, PA.

The Joseph T. Quinlan Bereavement Center provides grief support and coun-



seling for hospice families and the community. The staff works to bring comfort and understanding to help families through difficult times. Individual counseling and ongoing support groups are offered.

Registrants are encouraged to form a team to help raise funds through sponsorship. During online registration you can form a team and share with your friends and family through social media and email.

*On September 30th we will walk together so those in need of bereavement counseling never have to walk alone.*

Support groups include: anticipatory grief support, school bereavement support, memorial services, grief lecture series, children's bereavement art program and pet loss support.

The cost is \$25 for adults and \$15 for participants 13 and under. Registrations will also be accepted at the "Celebrate Life 5k" walk kick-off party which will be held on Friday, September 29 in the Romano Conference Center at Newton Medical Center from 4 p.m. – 6 p.m. All walkers are invited to attend the kick-off to register, pick-up their goodie bag, grab a healthy snack and get a walk t-shirt.

Prizes will be awarded to individuals and teams who raise the most money. Individuals who raise \$100 or more will get a memorial marker with their loved one's name displayed along the walk route. All money raised will stay in the community and benefit the Bereavement Center.

This year vendor applications are being accepted for those who would like to set up a table at the event. We will also hold an eternal light memorial to honor those whose lives we are celebrating.

# Reflections

“Relax, you’ll live longer.”

That comment was made to me during a time when I was being “hyperactive ballistic” over some really insignificant situation. Now, in my defense, the situation as it happened wasn’t insignificant to me, but upon some reflection, in the greater scheme of life in general, it was.

However...the comment stuck with me and the idea occurred to me (still being in “that” frame of mind) “Will relaxing really make me live longer?” I mean if my “time” has come, can I draw on a bank of stored relaxed moments to add to my life? “Well, I relaxed for 10 minutes on June 3, 1998 and therefore I have 10 more minutes to live?”

No, it doesn’t quite work like that. So, being in “the mood” I thought “fine, forget the ‘longer’ part, which left me with ‘Relax, you’ll live.’” Aha!! there it is!! “Relax, you’ll live.” What a wonderful concept!

Ever get “up tight,” “wired,” “really stressed out?” Did you ever get so worked up that you made a hurricane seem like a summer breeze.

Do people describe you as “rationally challenged” or constantly experiencing a “peace deficit?”

Think back (hopefully way back) to a time when you were like that. Can you

remember what your body felt like? What your voice sounded like? What your face looked like? Let me give you a few hints the body was stiff and tight, the breath was shallow and short. The voice was up a few octaves, words were fast and had a bit of an edge to them. The vocabulary probably didn’t have a lot of kind words in it. The face was tense, lips were pursed and if there was any separation it was in the form of a grimace, not a smile. The eyes were a little squinty and narrow, the jaw couldn’t have been pried open with a crowbar.

On the inside, the stomach was churning, swallowing was difficult, blood vessels constricted. Doesn’t that sound wonderfully attractive? Oh yes, this is definitely the way I want to “live!”

Of course, there are things that we do get upset about. There are moments that the feeling we choose to have is one of frustration and discomfort or dis-ease. The problem arises when we are effectively living in this state consistently. It is not a happy place for us to be in, nor for others who are around us to experience. And that discomfort, that dis-ease can become what we are. There is another way.

Hindsight is definitely 20/20, but we have the marvelous capacity to remember and to learn. That is, we can use our hindsight to create our foresight. If there are certain things that really seem to “get to us” or “get under our skin” we can

examine them in relation to not only the present but the future and the past.

Did our past reactions actually resolve the situation? (Probably not because it is very difficult for the brain to function when all the blood is rushing to our face!) The situation was resolved when we calmed down (relaxed), or when we removed ourselves from our intense involvement and saw the bigger picture. We have a choice as to our behavior and the expression of our feelings in the present. Much more is accomplished when we do relax. That does not mean that we are being lazy, or uninterested, or uninvolved. It means that we are choosing to be and to do the best we can. We are choosing to think and act with clarity and understanding. When this happens we are really living totally and completely in the present moment. We lose our tunnel vision and are able to see the reality in which we are living not the past, not our fears, not our judgments.

A wonderful consequence of this “relaxing” is the effect it has on us! We are breathing fully, we are speaking clearly, the wrinkles in the face are a result of smiles, the eyes are seeing, the blood is flowing freely throughout our entire body. So, not only do we feel better, but other people are no longer running into things to get out of our way - so they are feeling better too! What power we wield but only when we RELAX!!

ued for over thirty years. It is the signature fundraising event of the Friends of Hospice with as many as 500 people attending. Other successful events over the years have included: Fur and Lingerie Brunch, High Tea Social, Harley Bike Raffle and a Dental Day generously supported by Dr. Ed Tirpack. The group not only holds events but donates generously to various campaigns, including the Home for Hospice and Joseph T. Quinlan Bereavement Center Capital Campaign.

The Friends of Hospice are always visible at all events, Butterfly Release, Tree Lightings and the Holiday Concert. They respond to requests made by social workers or nurses to fulfill the needs of patients or families. Often they purchase items that are not covered by Medicare or insurance. All funds raised go to patient care.

Willard, who sadly passed on Saturday, May 6, 2017, began stewardship of the property in 1948 when he worked as a farmhand. He and Jeanette met at a church youth group in 1948 and were married on the farm where Willard was renting a farmhouse in 1951.

As they acquired the farm, now encompassing over 400 acres, they raised two wonderful sons and are now the proud grandparents of four and great grandparents to six. The farm is now managed by grandson, Bradley Klemm.

In 1984 the Klemms agreed to allow The Friends of Hospice to hold a Wine and Cheese Festival on their property. To-date Waterwheel Farm and the Klemms have hosted over 30 Festivals. They have also hosted holiday receptions in their historic farmhouse with a roaring fire and house full of hospice staff and supporters.





The survey was designed to measure and assess the experiences of patients who died while receiving hospice care, as well as the experiences of their primary caregivers.
