


# CARE

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## In Memoriam:

"We pick up many treasures along life's journey. Some we discard, some we cherish, some become gifts of life and comfort for our fellow man. This was the essence of Arlene and Marion's life." As the Karen Ann Quinlan Hospice begins a new year, it is without two of our most treasured board members. Two memorials written with Love, Julia Quinlan.

On October 15, 2007, Dr. Arlene B. Jorgenson died peacefully in her home, surrounded by family and friends. She was well known and respected in Sussex County. Arlene began her career as an elementary school teacher in Frankford Township. Later she served as a junior high school teacher, principal and director of special resources in Sparta. In 1989, Dr. Jorgenson was appointed headmaster of Hilltop Country Day School, a small independent private school. She taught children and adults an

appreciation of fine arts and great artists. She helped lay the foundation for the development of Sussex County Community College. She later served as vice president and academic dean of SCCC. In 1987, she was recognized by the NJ Senate and awarded the NJ Senate Citation for outstanding education.

Dr. J as family and friends called her became a member of the Karen Ann Quinlan Memorial Foundation Governing Board in 1980. She served as Chairman of the Board, was a member of the Personnel Committee, By-Laws and Nominating committees. Arlene was a most generous and gracious lady. She never hesitated to greet you with a warm embrace and a kiss. Every spring she hosted the volunteer luncheon in her beautiful home. In addition, each December, she hosted the Hospice Holiday Reception. She loved people and enjoyed entertaining and we loved being there. She was a perfect hostess.




Dr. Arlene B. Jorgenson

I was privileged to sit at her bedside along with family and friends on her final journey home. We talked about her life and shared memories with her daughter, Ashleigh. Her last personal wish was to invite everyone to give one long-stem red rose to someone they love. It was an expression of how she lived her life. Her Memorial service was a celebration of her life. Many happy memories were shared. Her life and her death were filled with love.

On December 19, 2007, Marion Kerr Vitale died unexpectedly. She was raised on the family farm near Marksboro, Warren County, NJ. She returned to this area and established the Department of Social and Health Services in Sussex County. She helped to establish and administer the Visiting Homemakers Service. Marion was a graduate of Paterson General Hospital School of Nursing and the University of PA. She received her Masters Degree from Columbia University, and her preparation in physical therapy at Harvard Medical School, Boston, Mass. In 1954, Marion was one of 66 members chosen to participate in field trials to evaluate the effectiveness of the Salk vaccine in the United States and Canadian Provinces. She was an assistant professor in nursing education at St. John's University in Queens, NY.

In 1978, Marion joined the core group that was formed to study the feasibility of establishing a Hospice in Sussex County. In 1980, she became a charter member of the Karen Ann Quinlan Memorial Foundation Governing Board. She chaired the Personnel Committee, served as secretary to the Executive Committee, served on By-Laws and Nominating committees. About six years ago, Marion had a fall and later suffered a stroke. Although confined to a wheel chair, she continued to attend hospice meetings as often as possible.

In October 2007, my family and I attended her birthday celebration in her home. It was filled with Public Health Nurses, home health aides, family and friends. Marion enjoyed every moment of the day. She enjoyed the simple things in life. Yet she was one of the most intelligent and articulate women I have been privileged to call dear friend. I enjoyed my Friday luncheon visits with her. She spoke often of her life experiences and felt throughout her
